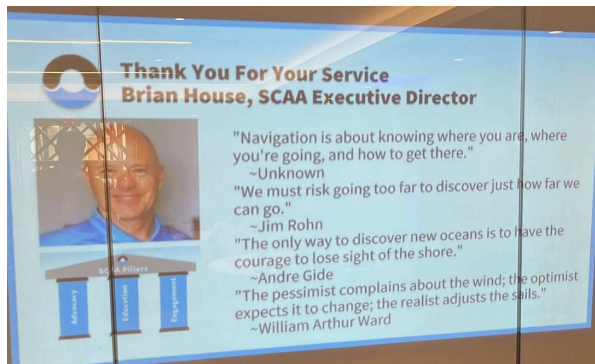

2025 Annual Meeting Recap (Day 1)

State of the Association Address

Speakers: Angie Martin (2023–2025 President), Steve Pelna (2025–2027 President)



Outgoing President Angie Martin (2023–2025) and incoming President Steve Pelna (2025–2027) highlighted the key achievements and priorities of the Spill Control Association of America (SCAA). The organization remains dedicated to being the leading voice for spill response professionals through advocacy at API SAG, PAT, and PHMSA meetings. Among the educational initiatives introduced were virtual engagement sessions, legal Lunch & Learns, and the FEL Program Scholarship. Engagement efforts also saw a boost with the launch of a new website, an expanded social media presence, and active participation in events like Clean Waterways and Clean Gulf 2024.



Despite a drop in membership due to industry consolidation, the association's financial health remains solid, with 2024 equity seeing an increase, alongside a 10% rise in annual sponsors. The board elections welcomed two new members, with Steve Pelna stepping into the role of President. He will be joined by VP Tim House, Treasurer Josh Clifford, and Secretary Larry Malizzi. Looking ahead, the goals for 2025–2026 include enhancing membership value, increasing regional meetings, boosting participation in Clean Events, modernizing bylaws, and improving administrative tools, as well as digital outreach. Members were also encouraged to express concerns or step away from uncomfortable discussions to ensure compliance with antitrust regulations.

2025 Annual Meeting Recap (Day 1)

Antitrust Compliance in Industry Settings

Speaker: Allen Bachman, K&L Gates

Bachman emphasized the importance of antitrust compliance for early identification of legal risks, litigation avoidance, and preventing regulatory penalties. Antitrust laws protect competition, lower prices, promote innovation, and enhance efficiency by prohibiting anti-competitive agreements, which can be horizontal (between competitors) or vertical (involving suppliers or customers). Horizontal agreements like bid rigging and price fixing pose significant legal risks, while vertical agreements are evaluated based on their market impact. All cartels, even informal ones, are illegal, and companies must steer clear of coordinated strategies or customer exclusions. Sharing sensitive information in joint bidding can violate antitrust laws, and miscommunication in trade associations may lead to violations as well. Additionally, practices like bid rotation, no-poach agreements, and wage fixing are prohibited, and while monopolies are not inherently illegal, using them to suppress competition is unlawful.



Membership Survey & Initiatives

Speaker: Chad Tameling, SET Environmental

The SCAA Membership Committee focuses on member retention, recruitment, and growth. Membership data reveals that 47% of members joined before 2015, 20% between 2015 and 2018, and 33% from 2020 to 2025. In 2024, initiatives like online bill pay, expanded regional meetings, a new voting process, a mentorship program, and Lunch & Learn sessions were launched, along with an annual satisfaction survey. Survey results showed that engaged members rated in-person events as the top benefit, with suggestions for improvement including enhancing those events, expanding meetings, creating a sponsor Toolbox, and increasing Lunch & Learn offerings.

Trends in Government Contracting

Speaker: Alex Gorelik, Taft Services

Gorelik emphasized the importance of strictly following rules when pursuing government contracts and clearly highlighting unique proposal aspects. Selecting the right team and providing complete information about affiliate relationships is crucial. Key personnel must genuinely be available for the proposed work. Recent government contracting updates include protests over SAM registrations and cybersecurity requirements, highlighting the need for improved systems. The Supreme Court's evolving approach may influence regulatory reliance, while upcoming changes in Department of Defense regulations and new considerations around tariff exclusions and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) policies are also noteworthy for contractors.



Luncheon Awards

Speaker: Chris Tracy, Heritage Environmental Services

This year's awards shifted focus toward educational support. Three Environmental Excellence Awards were presented to students from Purdue University and Massachusetts Academy, underscoring SCAA's investment in future spill response professionals.

Industry Collaboration & API's Knowledge Transfer Initiative

Speaker: Tim Steffek, API

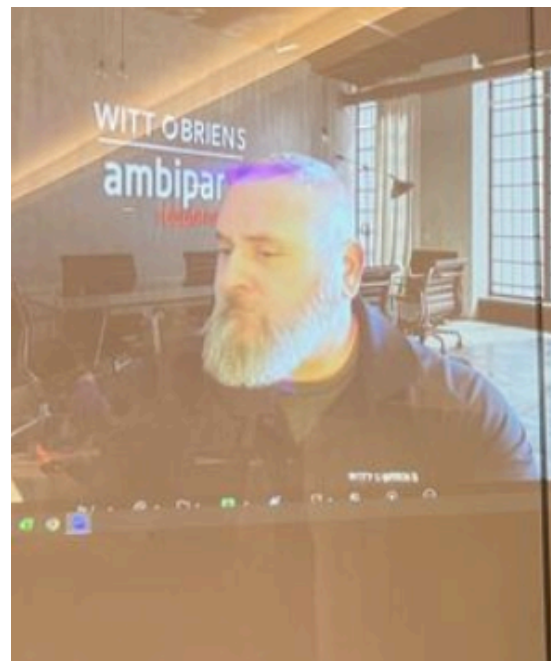


Founded in 1919, the American Petroleum Institute (API) represents the petroleum industry and has long focused on oil spill response. After the 2010 Deepwater Horizon disaster, API created the Joint Industry Task Force to improve offshore spill preparedness. Its Emergency Preparedness & Response Subcommittee oversees four phases of spill response, from immediate action to post-crisis recovery, balancing resources and collaboration. API offers recommended practices, tactical guides, and training resources like OilSpillPrevention.org and a video library to support responders. Upcoming events include a Dispersant Workshop in September 2025, all aimed at maintaining knowledge and improving spill control efforts industry-wide.

EPA FRP WCD Rule Updates

Speaker: John Carroll, Witt O'Brien's

Carroll noted that program funding won't begin until late 2025, with EPA compliance needed by July 2027. Facilities must adhere to regulated quantities and prepare for worst-case discharges based on specific chemicals. Response resources are shifting from OSROs to SROs, but no certification database for OSROs exists. Plan holders must evaluate resources by hazard severity and include necessary monitoring equipment. While training drills are optional, confusion over the lack of PREP amendments has led the EPA to update guidelines. Coordination with officials must be documented, requiring response within one hour and equipment deployment within two hours. Disposal plans must comply with OPA 90 and address firefighting runoff. Facility owners must confirm plan reviews, and Qualified Individuals (QIs) need hazard knowledge and Incident Command training, with a focus on hazard evaluations and monitoring air and water.

U.S Coast Guard (USCG) Updates

Speakers: CAPT Trey Wirth & CDR Matt Richards



Captain Wirth and CDR Richards spoke on adjusting to new administration priorities and how there is a continued focus on the changing and dynamic response landscape. Domestic planning addresses emerging threats such as vessel fires caused by lithium-ion batteries, emphasizing the need for ongoing centralized training to improve technical proficiency and understanding of these risks. Western Alaska oil spill planning criteria remain a priority, with MERCAT playing a key role in providing feedback. The next steps involve conducting risk assessments, evaluating applications, and continuing consultations. A feedback form is being used to gather input on recent project updates, alongside ongoing efforts in national salvage and marine firefighting.

Electronic Hazard Communication (eHazcom)

Speaker: Shane Kelley, PHMSA

Kelley examined how electronic communication can effectively replace physical documentation, significantly improving both safety and efficiency. The discussion focused on the potential to shift from paper to electronic formats for essential documents such as shipping papers, emergency response information, dangerous goods manifests, special permits, and certificates of registration. Nevertheless, challenges persist in balancing the needs and responsibilities of shippers, carriers, and the emergency response community. It's crucial to ensure that electronic solutions not only meet but ideally surpass the effectiveness of traditional paper documents. Electronic permits can be as secure, if not more so, than their paper counterparts, with the overarching aim of developing a dynamic, problem-solving system that cuts down on unnecessary paperwork. Innovations like QR codes are being introduced to deliver detailed documentation for Oil Spill Response (OSR) trailer information.



Day 1 Opening Reception



Following the first day of the Annual Meeting, attendees came together for a lively and well-attended Opening Reception, generously sponsored by Arcwood. The event provided a relaxed atmosphere for members to unwind, reconnect with familiar faces, and build new industry relationships. With great food, drinks, and conversation, the reception set the tone for a collaborative and engaging week ahead. Arcwood's support made this memorable evening possible, helping to foster the strong sense of community that defines the Annual Meeting.



Annual Meeting Ghost Tour and Bar Crawl



A standout moment from the recent SCAA Regional Meeting in Washington, D.C., was the evening of networking and fun that followed the day's sessions. Attendees enjoyed a guided ghost tour through historic D.C., exploring the city's haunted landmarks and rich history. Battery Fire Clean-Up & Recovery

Speaker: Mark Steadman, Call2Recycle

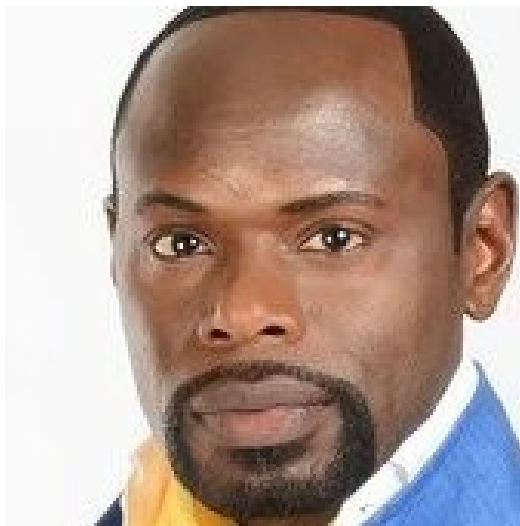
Steadman emphasized Call2Recycle Stewardship Services, a nonprofit managing battery recycling in the U.S. and Canada. They oversee battery management in states like New York, Minnesota, and Vermont, while participation is voluntary elsewhere. Their tasks include recycling consumer batteries and setting up collection sites. Batteries from devices are usually charged at 8-10% capacity. Call2Recycle meets manufacturers' obligations and manages recall collections. By 2026, only 30-45% of the U.S. will have battery recycling laws, raising concerns over e-bikes and electric vehicles. Collaboration with SCAA focuses on safety training and packaging assessment, highlighting the importance of understanding battery types and dimensions for safe transport.



Luncheon & Speaker Session

Speaker: James Williams, Environmental Technology Council

Williams, Executive Director of the Environmental Technology Council, discussed the 2025 legislative and regulatory forecast during the Luncheon & Speaker Session. He noted key changes in congressional committees and stressed the need for building relationships with them. New leadership is present in major federal agencies, including the EPA with Lee Zeldin and Steven Cook, and the DOT with Sean Duffy, with an upcoming appointment for the Coast Guard. Recent executive orders aim to reverse previous policies, including hiring freezes, budget cuts, and a halt on offshore wind leases. Federal agencies may turn to courts for repealing rules proposed after a critical May 1st deadline, with courts serving as checks on policy shifts. Tariff policies are also in flux.

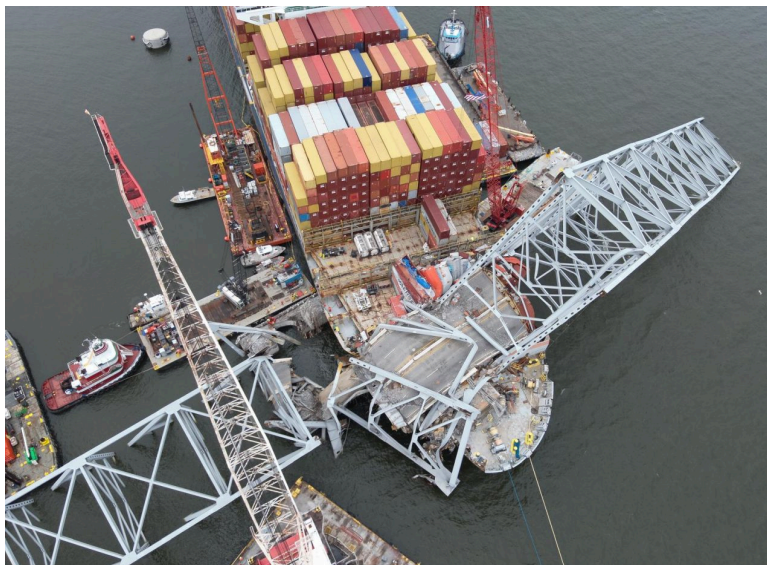
Environmental Challenges During Salvage of the M/V Dali

Speaker: Todd Duke, Resolve Marine



Duke spoke about how in 2024, the Francis Scott Key Bridge collapsed, blocking the Port of Baltimore and triggering a coordinated response from agencies like the U.S. Navy, EPA, DOJ, and others under the Incident Command System. Customs helped unload containers, while the Coast Guard managed ballast water treatment. Support from Baltimore Gas & Electric helped speed up response efforts. The collapse exposed infrastructure weaknesses and environmental risks, as the bridge was a key route for hazardous materials.

The salvage plan involved stabilizing the vessel, monitoring bridge movement, unloading hazardous and non-hazardous cargo, and safely removing the bridge using controlled explosive cutting and fire protection systems. Challenges included shutting down high-voltage lines and working around a natural gas pipeline beneath the ship. Phase 2 focused on removing the road debris, cleanup, relocating the ship, and decontamination efforts.

2025 Regional Meeting Recap

In April, Denver hosted SCAA's 2025 Regional Meeting, bringing together important agencies, industry leaders, and stakeholders from the spill response community. This meeting was a chance for people to connect and share ideas to improve spill prevention and response.

Attendees discussed the growing challenges of non-floating oils and hazardous chemicals in rivers and waterways. As inland spill situations become more complicated, the conversations focused on practical strategies for managing risks and protecting the environment. Participants also learned about updated Incident Command System (ICS) procedures, which are important for staying prepared and improving response efforts.

The event featured a panel of experts who shared their experiences and insights. Their stories provided real-world lessons and encouraged critical thinking about the need for collaboration in creating a more effective spill response framework.

After the Regional Meeting, attendees moved on to the Clean Waterways Conference, which continued the discussions from earlier in the week. This event gave professionals a chance to share best practices, strengthen partnerships, and improve readiness for environmental incidents.

The EEL Committee is excited to announce that applications for the EEA will reopen in the Fall of 2025, inviting the next generation of environmental leaders to showcase their passion and innovative ideas in emergency response.



Government Affairs Committee Updates

The Government Affairs Committee (GAC) continues to be a cornerstone of progress, strategy, and advocacy for the Spill Control Association of America (SCAA). In recent years, the GAC has not only redefined its internal operations but has also positioned itself as a vital force in shaping national policy, supporting industry preparedness, and amplifying the collective voice of SCAA's membership.

In 2024, the GAC underwent a major transformation under the visionary leadership of then-Chair Brian House. This transformation, known as the “GAC 2.0” initiative, marked the beginning of a new era of strategic organization and increased operational capacity. What began as a recalibration quickly evolved into a full-scale redesign of how the committee functions and serves SCAA and the broader spill control community.

The GAC expanded to a 17-member committee with diverse expertise in regulatory affairs, science, technology, environmental response, and government relations. This growth reflects the increasing complexity of issues the GAC faces. To manage the workload, the committee adopted a structured inquiry response model that categorizes topics into Emerging Topics, Science and Technology, and Regulatory and Legislative matters. Each issue is evaluated for relevance and urgency, assigned a status of Active, Monitor, Table, or Idle, and prioritized as High, Medium, or Low. For Active and High Priority issues, a “Call to Action” is issued to the SCAA membership to mobilize resources and encourage timely engagement.

From there, the GAC forms dedicated subcommittees composed of subject matter experts recruited from SCAA's membership. These experts are tasked with researching the issue, gathering supporting data, collaborating with stakeholders, and ultimately developing actionable recommendations. The GAC then reviews these recommendations and determines the appropriate course of action, whether that be a formal response, public comment, policy development, or continued monitoring.



Government Affairs Committee Updates

To support greater transparency and continuity, the committee is also in the process of launching a comprehensive tracking system that will log and monitor all inquiries. Once operational, this system will be accessible to the full membership and provide real-time insight into the progress of specific issues and GAC activity. This will empower members to stay informed, get involved, and better understand how key decisions are being made within the association.

The GAC engages in strategic external partnerships to support its mission and enhance SCAA's voice nationally and regionally. Collaborating with organizations like the Partnership Action Team, API-COM, and the American Petroleum Institute's Spills Advisory Group helps the GAC align with industry efforts, avoid duplication, and stay involved in key conversations about preparedness, environmental response, and risk mitigation.

The GAC engages in advocacy through annual visits to Capitol Hill, representing SCAA's interests to lawmakers and regulatory agencies. These discussions are crucial for shaping policies on spill response, emergency planning, and environmental protection. Incorporating industry expertise ensures that the resulting regulations are more practical and effective.

As the Government Affairs Committee continues to grow in scope and capability, it remains deeply aligned with the overall mission of the SCAA, to educate, advocate, and engage. Through its structured operations, collaborative outreach, and data-driven policy engagement, the GAC is ensuring that the association stays ahead of industry challenges and remains responsive to the evolving landscape of environmental protection.

Behind every inquiry resolved, every policy shaped, and every collaboration formed, the GAC is actively strengthening the association. Its work may not always be visible, but its impact is felt industry-wide. The GAC is not simply responding to change, it is helping to lead it.
